	<p>"He's just trying to make us pity him. What an imagination he has." (5).</p>
	<p>"The yellow star? Oh, well, what of it? You don't die of it..." (9).</p>
	<p>"On we went between the electric wires. At each step, a white placard with a death's head on it stared us in the face. A caption: "Warning. Danger of death" (37).</p>
	<p>"I've got more faith in Hitler than in anyone else. He's the only one who's kept his promises, all his promises, to the Jewish people" (77).</p>
